Series Narrative

Employees in this series administer physical therapy treatments in a health care facility as prescribed by a licensed physician. At the higher levels of the series, they supervise or coordinate physical therapy treatment programs.

DESCRIPTIONS OF LEVELS OF WORK

Level I: Physical Therapist I

Employees at this level administer physical therapy treatments as prescribed by a physician. They work under general supervision from a designated supervisor.

A Physical Therapist I typically –

- 1. administers physical therapy treatment (such as application of heat or cold, air, water, electricity, sound and radiant energy); performs tests and measurements of muscles, nerves, skin temperature, range of joint motion, etc., involving manual or electrical means; and interprets results
- 2. instructs patients in therapeutic exercise and ambulation, in the use of ambulatory aids, and in the application of slings, braces, and other prosthetic or orthotic devices
- 3. devises or adapts equipment enabling patients to participate in treatment or to maintain a level of achievement
- 4. records prognosis, treatment, response, and progress in patient's chart or enters information into computer
- 5. administers manual exercises, massage or traction to help relieve pain, increase patient strength, or decrease or prevent deformity or crippling
- 6. instructs patient and family in treatment procedures to be continued at home
- 7. maintains patients' treatment records and makes progress reports
- 8. supervises non-professional personnel as assigned
- 9. performs related duties as assigned

Level II: Physical Therapist II

Employees at this level administer and supervise physical therapy treatment in a section of the larger physical therapy department or in a small, independent physical therapy unit. They work under direction from a designated supervisor.

A Physical Therapist II typically –

- 1. supervises lower level Physical Therapists, students, and non-professional staff
- 2. reviews physician's referral and patient's medical records to help determine diagnosis and physical therapy treatment required
- 3. plans, prepares, carries out, and schedules individually designed programs of physical treatment to maintain, improve, or restore physical functioning, alleviate pain and prevent physical dysfunction in patients
- 4. evaluates data to identify problems and determine a diagnosis prior to intervention
- 5. integrates physical therapy programs with those of other services; confers with the patient, medical practitioners and appropriate others to plan, implement, and assess the intervention program
- 6. evaluates effects of treatment at various stages and adjusts treatments to achieve maximum benefit
- 7. assists with administrative duties of section or unit
- 8. prepares requisitions; receives/stores supplies and equipment as required
- 9. administers physical therapy treatment as required
- 10. performs related duties as assigned

Level III: Physical Therapist III

Employees at this level administer and supervise physical therapy programs in several clinic areas or medical disciplines. They work under direction from a designated supervisor.

A Physical Therapist III typically -

- 1. coordinates physical therapy treatment programs in several clinic areas or medical disciplines, involving scheduling of patients and lower level Physical Therapists
- 2. plans and schedules assignments of student Physical Therapists through various clinics; counsels students; and makes evaluation reports on their progress
- 3. assists in organizing and directing in-service training programs for staff and student physical therapists

- 4. supervises and evaluates performance of lower level Physical Therapists and non-professional staff
- 5. is responsible for maintaining departmental personnel records, supplies, and equipment, as required
- 6. recommends supply/equipment purchases, space requirements, supplies, and need for additional personnel
- 7. recommends procedures and policy changes
- 8. administers physical therapy treatment, as required
- 9. performs related duties as assigned

Level IV: Physical Therapist IV

<u>4136</u>

Employees at this level develop and coordinate a program of physical therapy treatment in a department of physical medicine and rehabilitation. They work under administrative direction from a licensed physician.

A Physical Therapist IV typically –

- 1. develops, implements, and administers programs of physical therapy, with overall responsibility for lower level Physical Therapists
- 2. organizes and directs in-service training programs for staff and student physical therapists
- 3. reviews evaluation reports of clinic assignments of student Physical Therapists; counsels students and evaluates their progress
- 4. responsible for overall effectiveness of physical therapy treatment programs and maintenance of up-to-date technical practices; recommends changes in departmental policies and operational procedures
- 5. is responsible for the supervision and evaluation of lower level Physical Therapists and nonprofessional staff; recruits, interviews, and orients new employees to department
- 6. administers physical therapy treatment, as required
- 7. performs related duties as assigned

- 1. Knowledge of patient care assessment, planning, implementation, and coordination of care
- 2. Knowledge of operation, maintenance, and instruction of relevant therapy equipment
- 3. Skill in assessment of patients' treatment needs
